Phase 1: Refining the Patient Room – The Live Patient Mock-Up Room Is Under Way

Phase 1 of an exciting project designed to ensure that the inpatient rooms in the new hospital are comfortable, safe and provide an environment that promotes healing for our patients began September 2 on J6 at UMCP.

During Phase 1 of the project, the Mock-Up room was constructed with foam core and other temporary materials. Fifty sessions for all employees -- with three for physicians-only -- were conducted by Ismini Naos, a medical planner from HOK, one of the architectural firms working on the new hospital. If you were unable to schedule yourself to attend a session, please feel free to visit the room between 7:30 a.m. and 7:30 p.m. on September 17, 18 and 21. The room will be open to allow employees to view it at their convenience, and to leave written feedback if desired.

The room is designed to promote safety and wellness, reducing staff fatigue while allowing for increased comfort of the patient and his or her family within the healing environment. The final layout of the components and features of the room will be based on research as well as evidence-based design concepts, layered with the input that will be gathered through the

50 user groups, as well as the expertise of the architects and designers working on the new hospital.

"To date, more than 300 employees and physicians have come through the patient room," says Naos. "All of the feedback which I am receiving is very insightful and useful. As a design team, we will use these comments and suggestions as a basis for revisions to the room which will be implemented in the next mock-up phase."

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UMCP Again Ranked Among Nation's Top 5% for Maternity Care

University Medical Center at Princeton (UMCP) has been ranked among the top 5% percent of hospitals in the nation for maternity care services based on a study by HealthGrades, an independent healthcare ratings company. It is the fourth straight year HealthGrades has ranked UMCP in the nation's top 5% percent for maternity services.

HealthGrades also recognized UMCP with its fifth straight Maternity Care Excellence Award and fifth straight "fivestar rating" for maternity services.

"We are extremely proud of our services for mothers and babies, and of our consistent ranking among the nation's top 5% percent for maternity services," says Susan Lorenz, UMCP Vice President for Patient Care Services and Chief Nursing Officer. "We know that families in the region hold the hospital in extremely high regard for maternity care. We're very proud of that, and we view these rankings and awards as further validation of the high quality of care that families receive when they come through our doors."

UMCP delivers approximately 2,000 babies each year. Features of the maternity program include:

- Care from a team of board-certified physicians including gynecologists, obstetricians, high-risk obstetricians, anesthesiologists, neonatologists and pediatricians;
- Advanced maternal-fetal medicine services that include 3D and 4D ultrasound for careful monitoring of fetal development;
- Certified Level II Special Care Nursery;
- State-of-the-art labor suite designed to ensure comfort and privacy, and recently-renovated maternity rooms with hotel-like décor, private bath and accommodations for fathers or domestic partners to spend the night;
- Hundreds of free and low-cost classes for expectant and new parents, siblings and grandparents. Recent offerings have included a HypnoBirthing course that teaches expectant mothers self-hypnosis techniques toward a faster, less painful and less stressful childbirth; and Daddy Boot Camp,TM a course that helps prepare expectant fathers for life with baby.

Since July, doctors from The Children's Hospital of Philadelphia (CHOP) are available 24/7 for consultation in UMCP's nursery.

White Elephant Art, Antiques and Rummage Sale Important Parking Information

In preparation for the White Elephant Art, Antiques and Rummage Sale on September 26 and September 27, approximately 30 to 35 employees (VPs, directors and nurse managers) will be relocated from the parking garage on September 24 and 25. These employees will all be contacted directly by Transportation Services by September 18, 2009. Transportation services will communicate with each employee individually and provide instructions for off-site parking and utilization of the van service. Additional shuttle vans will be running every 10 to 15 minutes. The Medical Staff will be asked (via e-mail) to move to different levels in the garage.

The doctor's area on the first level will close at 5 p.m. on Wednesday, September 23, and will re-open at 6 a.m. on Monday, September 28. Physicians will be relocated to parking areas designated "Physician Parking Only," on the basement level, so they can exit the garage quickly and easily.

Additional staff and other resources will be allocated to ensure physicians' and employees' convenience during White Elephant preparation.

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
